





n Aug 03, VGAC HCMC established a Charity Fund and since then, charity activities have been done throughout VGAC chapters.

VND 50 million are the largest amount VGAC HCMC has collected since the Charity Fund was established. Mr. Nguyen Phi Dzung and Mr. Trinh Quang Bao, **HCMC Charity Fund Manager** visited Phu Yen province to donate VND 35 million to Phu Yen Ophthalmology Centre for cataract operations of poor patients in Son Hoa district. The remained VND 15 million was donated to a centre for handicapped children. The sum was contributed by many VGAC members, their friends and families as well as Vietnamese expats from Australia.

This was then followed by "Music and Charity Night" Gala Dinner in Hanoi on 17 Mar 04.

I think Vietnam should have colleges like TAFE to cater for such a huge untrained labor market. The business and operation method of TAFE are so practical and productive. I've learnt a lot about this model and wish to apply as many concepts as possible when business opportunity for opening a vocational school in HCMC is mature.

The visiting trip to Perth was really good for me, both in knowledge and building useful contacts. It was the best opportunity for me to understand very well about the Australian educational system that has so many things and aspects to learn.

Types of job interviews

You are invited for an interview with recruiters through head-hunting service or self application and not sure what the recruiters want to know about you, what information you are going to talk?

nticipate the situation and with good preparation will help you have more advantages than other candidates. There are many forms of interview which has different purpose. The following are typical interview forms which may guide you how to deal with job interviews. The below information not always applied correctly for all cases, you sometimes should adapt the interview flexibly accordingly to interview topics, situation, etc.

. Screening interview

A member of the personnel department usually conducts the screening interview, which is meant to weed out unqualified candidates. Providing facts about your skills is more important than establishing rapport. Interviewers will work from an outline of points they want to cover, looking for inconsistencies in your resume,

and challenging your qualifications. Provide answers to their questions, and never volunteer any additional information. That information could work against you.

2. One-On-One interview

In one-on-one interviews, it has been established that you have the skills and education necessary for the position. The interviewer wants to see if you will fit in with the company, and how your skills will complement the rest of the department. Your goal in a one-on-one interview is to establish rapport with the interviewer and show him or her that your qualifications will benefit the company.

3. Stress interview

Stress interviews usually are a deliberate attempt to see how you handle yourself. The interviewer may be sarcastic or argumentative, or may keep you waiting. Expect this to

happen, and when it does, don't take it personally. Calmly answer each question as it comes. Ask for clarification if you need it, and never rush into an answer. The interviewer also may lapse into silence at some point during the questioning. Recognize this as an attempt to unnerve you. Sit silently until the interviewer resumes the questions. If a minute goes by, ask if he needs clarification of your last comments.

4. Lunch interview

The same rules apply in lunch interviews as in those held at the office. The setting may be more casual, but remember it is a business lunch and you are being watched carefully. Use the lunch interview to develop common ground with your interviewer. Follow his or her lead in both selection of food and in etiquette.

5. Committee interview

Committee interviews are a common practice. You will face several members of the company who have a say in whether you are hired. When answering questions from several people, speak directly to the person asking the

question. It is not necessary to answer to the group. In some committee interviews, you may be asked to demonstrate your problem- solving skills. The committee will outline a situation and ask you to formulate a plan that deals with the problem. You don't have to come up with the ultimate solution. The interviewers are looking for how you apply your knowledge and skills to a real-life situation.

6. Group interview

A group interview is usually designed to uncover the leadership potential of prospective managers and employees who will be dealing with the public. The front-runner candidates are gathered together in an informal, discussion-type interview. A subject is introduced and the interviewer will start off the discussion. The goal of the group interview is to see how you interact with others and how you use your knowledge and reasoning powers to win others over. If you do well in the group interview, you can expect to be asked back for a more extensive interview.
